Ian was a former Sergeant in Huron County and currently works in our Indigenous Policing Bureau. He will serve the community and detachment well during his temporary assignment in Huron County
- S/Sgt. Ryan Olmstead provided a comprehensive overview and explanation of the report for the month
- Traffic stats as traffic volume increases on the roads, almost each category have gone up
- Increase in Etickets in tickets and warnings
- S/Sgt. Ryan Olmstead noted that he is a huge advocate of community engagement and awareness it is important that the Officers are visible in the community and to the public
- Encouraging increased foot patrols
- Noted that property crime has increased
- Clearance rates are all up
- Calls for Services almost the same as last year
- Focus patrol target Recreation and skate board parks OPP visibility is important in these areas
- Proactive enforcement foot patrols hard during COVID
- It was noted that some community members have commented that with the closure of the station in Exeter, there are not as many cruisers in Exeter in reality, they don't see them at the station or leaving the station they are very noticeable specifically in the rural areas more presence than ever before noted that all their tools are equipped in the cruiser and that is their office
- South Huron Hospital and High School offer Office space and washroom facilities to the Officers – Police presence is very much alive in South Huron – the office is gone, the Officers are not

Media Releases

ASSAULT PEACE OFFICER & RESIST ARREST CHARGES LAID

(SOUTH HURON, ON) – Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has charged a South Huron resident with three criminal charges following an incident that took place in Exeter last weekend.

Shortly after 1:00 p.m. on Friday, May 6, 2022 Huron OPP officers responded to an Anne Street residence to help remove an individual from the premise as he was no longer welcome. Upon arrival the irate man began yelling, screaming and causing a disturbance in the middle of the road.

When the officer attempted to arrest the accused the man resisted and assaulted the officer.

Kyle GORDON, 27 years of age from South Huron has been charged with: Causing a Disturbance, Resist Peace Officer and Assault a Peace Officer. The accused has since been released from custody with a court appearance scheduled for May 30, 2022 at the Ontario Court of Justice – Goderich.

RACER STOPPED NEAR GRAND BEND

(SOUTH HURON, ON) – A resident of London has been charged with Sunt Driving following a traffic stop that took place last weekend just north of Grand Bend.

On Saturday, May 21, 2022, at approximately 7:20 p.m. a Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officer was conducting RADAR patrol on Bluewater Veteran's Highway when he observed a sport utility vehicle travelling northbound into Grand Bend at a high rate of speed. A speed measurement was taken and the vehicle was found to be travelling more than 70 km/h over the posted 50 km/h zone.

A traffic stop was conducted and the driver was subsequently charged. Jordan D'INTINO, 19 years of age from London has been charged with Race a Motor Vehicle – Excessive Speed. The defendant now must attend Provincial Offences Act court in Goderich to answer to the charge.

Our Human Trafficking Team

Who: One WRPS Sergeant and two Investigators from WRPS, one Investigator from GPS and a Human Trafficking Crisis Intervention Consellor from Victim Services. As well, partner agencies of Waterloo Region Sexual Assault & Domestic Violence Treatment Center. The teamalso has one member attached to the IJFS (Intelligenceled Joint Forces Strategy)

Where: Waterloo and Wellington Region

Why: To create a wraparound support to victims of human trafficking, and offer a holistic approach to trafficking investigations. This team will not only offer specialized investigative services, but also, through Victim Services, counselling, emergency and long term housing plans, medical support, basic needs, court support, safety planning etc.











What is Human Trafficking?


Human Trafficking is the act of force, fraud or coercion to control another person in the purpose to benefit from their exploitation within work. Two main types of trafficking is sex trafficking, or labour trafficking.

Human Trafficking does NOT need to include the transportation or movement between areas. Someone can be groomed, recruited and trafficked within the same town that they live in, with no transportation required.

Any reference to "human trafficking" herein refers specifically to o sex trafficking.

Sex Work VS. Sex Trafficking

Sex Work and Sex Trafficking are different.



Selling Sex is Legal, **Buying Sex is NOT**

Coercion:

Someone has manipulated you into working in the sex trade, made this decision for you. ** Sex Trafficking**

Working within the sex trade solely based on your own decision, no other parties involved, made with a sound mind . ** Not Sex

Working within the sex trade due to financial circumstance, needing to get by and make money for specific reasons. ** Not Sex **Trafficking****, but vulnerabilities within this stage could lead to a

The Criminal Code amendments in 2005 resulted in the creation of 3 new indictable offenses that specifically address human trafficking:


- The main offence 279.01 is Trafficking in Persons prohibits the recruitment, transportation, harboring or controlling of the movements of another for the purpose of exploiting or facilitating the exploitation of that person (power, control)
- The second offence 279.02 is Receiving a Material Benefit prohibits anyone from receiving a financial or other material benefit, knowing that it results or is derived directly or indirectly from trafficking of a person (money).
- The third offense 279.03 is Withholding Documents prohibits the withholding or destruction of documents such as a victim's identification, immigration or travel documents - for the purpose of trafficking of that person (passports).

Our Region

- In Waterloo Region & Guelph-Wellington, the majority of sex trafficking is occurring within ulletmotels/hotels/Airbnb
- Both men and women have been charged with trafficking. ullet
- Most victims of Sex Trafficking who come to the attention of Waterloo Regional Police and Guelph ulletPolice are young women and girls who range in age from 14 to 47 years old.
- Human Trafficking is a vastly UNDER reported crime, and these numbers only show a small glimpse • into the real problem of sex trafficking in Waterloo Region.
- This Region is along the 401 corridor. This has always been pipeline community for drug trafficking ulletand now continues to be for human trafficking. It creates an easy escape for traffickers being able to quickly move from different jurisdictions.

Stages of Exploitation

Luring Stage:

• The trafficker will assess for the right victim, test their vulnerabilities and boundaries, collect as much information on the victim, all while making them feel cared for, special and seen.

Grooming Stage ("Honeymoon Stage"):

• The trafficker will sell the victim the dream they told them within the Luring Stage. Shower them in gifts and compliments, make them feel as if they've met their dream partner. May introduce them to illicit drugs.

Coercion and Manipulation Stage:

• The trafficker will withdraw and begin to send emotional mixed messages, compliance with sex will start being rewarded with money or illicit drugs, start to test the trauma bond and dependency they have created . Isolate victim from supports they have. May bring up the idea of having sex with others.

Exploitation Stage:

• The trafficker will start to threaten their safety, as well as their loved ones safety. Begin to convince the victim they have a debt to pay them due to the gifts and drugs from the previous stages, told that sex work is the only way to make the money back fast, may start to initiate physical and emotional abuse.

Recruitment Stage:

• The Trafficker will now suggest the victim can help him teach and bring more girls into the game. Recruiters will gain their control and power back, and will see less "clients". Creates safety for those already entrenched.

Who Does it Happen To?

Human Trafficking can happen to anyone, from any socioeconomic background, race, gender, culture or age group. While 95% of reported cases in Canada involve women and girls, sex trafficking can and does happen to men and boys in Canada.

Most reported cases involve trafficked individuals who are Canadian-born women and girls between the ages of 14-22 years old. According to Statistics Canada, over 70% of victims identified by police are under the age of 25. The average age is estimated to be 17 and many being recruited are as young as 12 and 13 years old.

Certain groups tend to be at higher-risk including:

- Young women and girls
- Indigenous women and girls
- Youth in care
- Those with mental health and addiction issues
- New immigrants
- Homeless youth
- LGBTQ+ youth

According to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), in recent years, individuals with relatively stable backgrounds are becoming increasingly targeted.

Risk factors

Although there is no standard "profile" for a victim of human trafficking, the following factors make individuals more vulnerable to traffickers:

- Unmet Basic Needs
- Mental health issues
- Low self-esteem
- Learning disabilities
- Social isolation
- Abuse or lack of support in the family
- Violence in the home
- Poverty and a need for survival

******Group home concerns**

Self-actualization Promises of fulfilled dreams or reached potential (marriage, family, career, degree, travel, adventure, fame, wealth)

Self-esteem Buy the child expensive or popular clothing and jewelry. compliments and flattery

Love and belonging

Spend time with him/her, participate in their favorite activities, be present and engaged in their life, offer love, marriage, family

Safety and security

Offer safety and protection against abusive parents or peers. Rescue him/her from potential life threatening or harmful situations, promise protection and financial security for the youth

Physiological needs

Provide food, shelter, clothes, etc. to a youth who may not be provided with these items at home or a homeless youth who is too young to find employment to provide these basic needs for themselves

"Why Don't They Just Leave?"

- Fear of themselves and loved ones can occur during all stages, but specifically during exploitative
- Distrust police and support organizations how we treat them in one Region, parlays into their trust or distrust elsewhere
- Trauma Bond with trafficker usually created by 'Romeo Pimp'
- Don't realize they are being trafficked naïve due to age, demographic, mental capacity, substance abuse, etc
- Don't know how to get help reinforces the need for HT awareness campaigns
- Embarrassment, humiliation, shame would YOU be comfortable sharing your own victimization??
- Drug addiction fear of withdrawal, inhibits cognitive decision making, single -focused on feeding addiction
- Feel indebted to trafficker usually occurs in 'Rome Pimp' scenario
- Unsuccessful previous attempts to escape each unsuccessful attempt diminishes their hope in escaping
- Inability to speak privately officers need to be cognizant of latent barriers
- No support system reinforces the need for wrap-around supports offered by our current model

Tips When Speaking with Victims

- When speaking to an individual that has been trafficked it's important to be open, honest and non -judgmental.
- Instead of using words like counsellor or officer use your name and explain your role
- Since they have not had the options to make choices within their situation, give them their power back by asking them to choose things, such as a drink preference, where they would like to speak with you etc.
- Avoid using any blaming language. Eg. "Why haven't you left", "Why are you with this guy"
- Use client centered, trauma informed, and a harm reduction approach \bullet
- Engagement gain trust. Have patience. They can be difficult victims to deal with due to trauma incurred.
- Avoid asking "why" questions
- Safety plan, make it known that their safety is your number one priority
- Do not make promises you can't keep
- Check your language, be cautious using words like "human trafficking". Use the language they are using, if they identify their trafficker as their "boyfriend" or "friend", don't correct them

BE AUTHENTICALLY EMPATHETICand if you can't be, find someone else who can.**
