CANADA ROAD SAFETY WEEK RESULTS FOR HURON COUNTY OPP

Huron OPP Sees Two Fatal Collisions During Traffic Safety Campaign

(HURON COUNTY, ON) – Huron County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers were very busy during the recent Canada Day Road Safety Week campaign that ran from June 25, 2022, to July 3, 2022. Officers paid close attention to the "Big 4" causal factors in serious collisions on OPP patrolled roadways; Impaired Driving, Distracted Driving, Aggressive Driving and Failing to Wear a Seatbelt.

Huron County OPP officers laid a total of 226 charges during the campaign.

164 - Speeding

7 - Failing to Wear a Seatbelt

1 - Impaired Operation

Huron County OPP also investigated a total of 34 crashes during the campaign. 12 of those crashes were with animals, eleven with deer and one with a coyote. Some of the other noteworthy crashes included two fatal crashes. One involved a 17-year-old cyclist that was struck and killed on Crediton Road. The second fatal crash involved a vehicle that collided with a bridge abutment on Rodgerville Road. A 27-year-old driver died in the crash.

Additionally, a motorcyclist sustained life-threatening injuries after he collided with a deer, a 19-year-old was served with a 3-day driver's licence suspension after she drove into a ditch after drinking alcohol and there was also a collision involving a horse and buggy that was struck by a vehicle.

"Despite the high levels of visibility and enforcement we still experienced some very serious crashes during the campaign, two of which were fatal. Our primary goals remain the same during our traffic safety campaigns - Provide a high level of awareness, visibility, and enforcement to reduce serious collisions on our roadways. And secondly, to target those drivers that put others at risk. Every single driver must do their part to help prevent these deadly crashes by driving in a safe and responsible manner."

Re: Community Safety and Well-Being Plan - Update

The purpose of this update report is to update the South Huron Police Services Board on the current status of South Huron's Community Safety and Well-Being Plan and:

- 1. to request that the Board review and provide feedback on the proposed framework (Schedule "A"); and
- 2. to request that the Board forward the request for Oversight Committee member to the Huron OPP Detachment for the Huron County Community Safety and Well-Being Plan (CSWBP) Oversight Committee (Schedule "B"); and
- 3. to request that the Board review and provide feedback on the social media schedule (Schedule "C").

#### **Background**

Since the last update to the Board in November of 2021, the working group has met several times. In February of 2022, there was a discussion on municipal budgets for the plan and it was noted that many of the lower tier municipalities have put funds in their budget for CSWP which range from five thousand to ten thousand for 2022. There was also a discussion that groups like the Ontario Health Team (OHT) that are doing similar plans and to collaborate with these groups that already have working groups that are already are collecting data. There was a further discussion on various groups that may align with the working group for mental health concerns, housing and lower income needs.

At that meeting there was presentation from Laura O'Rourke. Laura provided an overview of Destination: Prosperity, an initiative of the Poverty to Prosperity Coalition of Huron, supported by the Huron Perth Public Health and funded by United Way Perth-Huron. This project started in 2016 and invites women to become engaged in enhancing the quality of life in their community and invite service providers to make changes in the way they provide services as the local level. There are six communities in Huron County that are supported through this project. These communities include Huron Park, Dungannon, Brussels, Vanastra, Blyth and Hensall.

In March of 2022, the working group met and Barbara Hall from Huron County Housing and provided the working group with a highlevel overview of housing and homelessness initiatives the County has underway. Pam Hannington from Huron Perth Public Health (HPPH) also attended the meeting and provided information on Huron and Area anti-poverty coalition – Poverty to Prosperity. She noted that the group was established in 2014 and gave an overview of the mission and vision to end poverty in Huron County and area and have healthy inclusive communities. She noted ongoing community development projects funded by Perth Huron United Way and hosted by HPPH.

The working group for the Huron County Community Safety and Well-Being Plan met on August 2, 2022 to discuss the current status of the plan. The plan has the following priority areas:

- 1. Mental Health and Addictions
- 2. Housing Stability and Homelessness
- 3. Domestic and Family Violence
- 4. Community Security

#### **Draft Framework**

The working group reviewed the draft framework that is being provided to the Police Services Board as Schedule "A" and approved it in principle. The thought process was that municipalities should collaborate and use existing organizations to reduce duplication and ensure communication between stakeholders and the municipality. The draft framework does not contain an exhaustive list of existing bodies and this list is a living document that can be changed as the situation warrants.

The importance of asking that stakeholders have the Community Safety and Well-Being Plan on the agendas was considered a priority as this was identified as being a current communication gap. The working group would like to have the collaborating sectors try to keep a community safety and well-being lens on their discussions to ensure that these organizations discuss the plan itself, look for opportunities for municipal collaboration and create an opportunity for further dialogue.

It was discussed that the "Oversight Committee" would be established which would meet quarterly that each municipality would reach out to a sector listed in the requirements for an Advisory Committee and request a member for the oversight committee. It was also discussed that each municipality may have it's own implementation team and/or sub-committee if deemed necessary depending on the project separate and apart from the oversight committee.

The working group is hoping to have an appointee by the end of November, with a report to go to Council for the new term of Council. South Huron was given the Police Service Board or Detachment Commander sector to request for representation.

Please note that the draft framework is for discussion at this point and staff would like Board feedback prior to taking the framework to the new term of Council.

#### **Social Media Schedule**

At the August meeting, there was also discussion on communication being a vital requirement for the plan. There were preliminary discussions on a website or Community Safety and Well-Being webpages and/or other communication strategies that may have future budget implications that should be further discussed at the next meeting.

At this time, the group felt that what we could do was prepare a social media schedule that each municipality could share on their own platforms and webpages. The idea would be to have some consistent messaging and then let each municipality have their own approach with the social media messaging (which may be tied to their own priorities).

The attached Schedule is a preliminary draft only and staff would like input from South Huron Police Services Board and/or OPP. The schedule is proposed for the balance of the 12 weeks in 2022 and includes the dates, themes, information, and images for most of the topics. I believe there is at least one or two posts for each of our 4 priority areas.

Members of the Advisory Committee would not have to attend every meeting if they were not presenting an update unless they wished to listen to the other presentations. This would alleviate the need for multiple Advisory Committees sitting at a municipal level engaging much of the same 'Champions' from the various sectors.

The Advisory Committee would also work together to form a Communication Strategy much like Perth County's Communication Strategy going forward, based on information received from Existing Bodies. Additionally, a Huron County CSWBP website would be beneficial and could be a collaborative effort.

#### Implementation teams/Municipal Coordinator

- can be set up municipally or across municipalities, depending on the issue being addressed and the level of involvement each municipality wants to engage in.
   le. South Huron, Central Huron and Goderich may wish to collaborate with respect to homelessness.
- Supervised, monitored or led by the municipality's member of the Advisory Committee
- Responsible for enacting communication strategy set out by Advisory Committee at their respective municipality
